

OJFSDA Annual Outstanding CDJFS Director of the Year Nomination Information

The Ohio Job and Family Services Directors' Association is comprised of our members' strengths and accomplishments. For us to reap the benefits of our membership's contributions to the JFS system, we must give recognition when it is due, and this annual award is one small way to do that. Please review the nomination criteria below and consider nominating a CDJFS Director whose commitment to the profession is worthy of recognition.

Nomination Process:

Current elected OJFSDA Officers comprise the Selection Committee tasked with reviewing all nominations and choosing one award recipient. While many directors are deserving of this award, the committee works diligently to select the individual of the highest professional caliber. The recipient will be notified by OJFSDA and asked to be present at the December General Session to receive the award. Those nominated but not chosen may be nominated again in subsequent years.

- Nominations must be submitted by October 31, 2024, via the online form [here](#). Late submissions will not be accepted.
- Nominations must be made by at least one current CDJFS Director.
- Current elected OJFSDA Officers are not eligible for nomination.
- Multiple nominations will be accepted, but the volume of nominations does not guarantee that a nominee will receive the award.
- Nominees do not have to be deeply involved in Association activities to be selected if the sum of their professional contributions outweighs other nominee's contributions. However, if candidates appear equally deserving, preference will be given to the candidate who has exhibited a strong commitment to OJFSDA.
- Nominations must include as much detail as possible and personal appraisals are factored into the selection process (please carefully consider the review criteria when preparing your nomination).
- Self-submitted or unsigned nominations will not be accepted.

Review Criteria:

- Special problem-solving accomplishments in CDJFS/CSEA/CSB in their county. (Can range from making vast improvements in an area that had been very problematic, solving specialized or tough problems, tackling serious union issues, staffing challenges, etc.)
- National, state, and/or county recognitions which have had a significant impact on job and family services or resulted in press recognitions (i.e. public radio, newspaper coverage, television interviews, etc.).
- Publications, articles, newspaper editorials (please compile and upload as one attachment to the online nomination form).
- Special assistance to other counties and/or fellow directors.
- Collaborative efforts for better services delivery, including shared services.
- Professional affiliations and membership in national, state, and/or local groups.
- Professional involvement in job and family services related committees, taskforces, or groups at the national, state, and/or local levels.
- Holding of chairperson positions, special appointments, officer positions, or other leadership positions in job and family services related projects, committees, etc.
- Leadership in special projects and piloting of efforts that result in a better product for all counties.
- Innovative programs, projects, and use of technology.
- OJFSDA involvement and commitment.
- Other awards and recognitions.
- Other personal or professional characteristics (i.e. academic background, teaching, personality strengths, communication style, workshop training, etc.), which contribute to outstanding performance and character.

Note: If you feel you do not know enough about the nominee's background to attest to some of the items on the above list, you may wish to talk to other people who have worked closely with the individual to obtain this information. The nomination will still be given serious consideration, even without the background information, if the narrative is sincere and personal.
